EXAMPLE OF A SUCCESSFUL QUERY LETTER FROM A REAL CLIENT

Dear Ms. Rivers,

OPENING HOOK: You're more likely to read about self-care in a lifestyle magazine than a children's story, but my debut picture book, THE BIG SQUEEZE, hopes to change that. After the year we've all just had, what better time than now to talk about dealing with burnout and anxiety? I'm writing to seek representation for this tale.

SPECIFIC PITCH: THE BIG SQUEEZE is a 500-word picture book starring a helpful little sponge who dutifully cleans up every mess in the kitchen. That is, until she grows so bloated and gross with food and spills that she can't soak up anything else. This story features food-flying fun plus a dramatic character transformation, as the sponge literally absorbs and becomes weighed down by everyone else's problems. In the spirit of the popular adage "you can't pour from an empty cup", the sponge learns that in order to be her best version for others, she has to be able to ask for help, and that a hug is a powerful thing.

AGENT RESEARCH: Your **MSWL** mentions being interested in picture books that tackle tough topics. Stress, responsibilities, and burnout are all topics that are hard for *adults* to talk about, never mind children. But after a year of families being stuck inside with no outlets and mental fuses blowing left and right, I think you'll agree that these are conversations that need to be had. I hope my earnest and overwhelmed sponge will act as a great conversation starter for families, not just today but through any stressful time.


RELEVANT AUTHOR BIO: I'm a **fellow Massachusettsian and a graduate of Boston College, where I majored in English**. In my professional life I have **always made sure "writer" is in my job title** (currently a technical writer), with the ultimate **hope that I would one day write for children and young adults**. Having recently become a mother, I finally find myself bursting with the right ideas for connecting with kids through good humor, wordplay, and relatable characters. THE BIG SQUEEZE is the first of these that I'm ready to send out into the world.

- Compelling opening hook, pitch with specific details, and relevant author bio
- Personal connection to the story/agent querying
- Any other relevant info

THE DON'TS OF FOLLOWING UP

Agents are people too, and we appreciate professionalism and kindness.



- Message agents on their socials
- Email when they only use QueryManager for subs
- Check in if/when they mention
 - Inundated with work
 - Personal issues
 - Use their stressful experiences as an excuse to follow up
- Respond to rejections
- Contact by phone
 - Do not text/call their personal/agency phone number
 - Do not text/call their family, friends, or colleagues
- Follow Up in Person
 - Do not ask about your submission at a conference, event, their agency, or any other place you see them in person
- Send a letter, gifts, etc. to their home/agency address
- Follow up repeatedly
- Receive full requests by other agents
- Have an updated version of your novel, UNLESS changes are significant





THE DOS OF FOLLOWING UP

If an agent requests your full manuscript:

- Do follow their guidelines for how they would like it submitted
- Do wait out the new timeline guidelines before following up
 - "It takes me 2-4 months to review full manuscripts."

If you receive similar feedback for revisions (and you agree):

- Do send the revised manuscript to agents who also had requested the full
- Do wait to hear back before following up again, UNLESS you have news, such as a WITHDRAWAL or an OFFER OF REPRESENTATION!





THE DOS OF FOLLOWING UP

- Do read agent guidelines beforehand
 - Check query response timeline on website: "I will do my best to respond to queries within 2 months"
 - Check social media updates: "I have responded to all queries sent before or on 11/19/2025"
- Do "Reply All" or Forward original query in your follow-up email (Query Manager does this for you)
- Do be polite; Agents are people too
- Do let agents know if you are withdrawing your submission


